

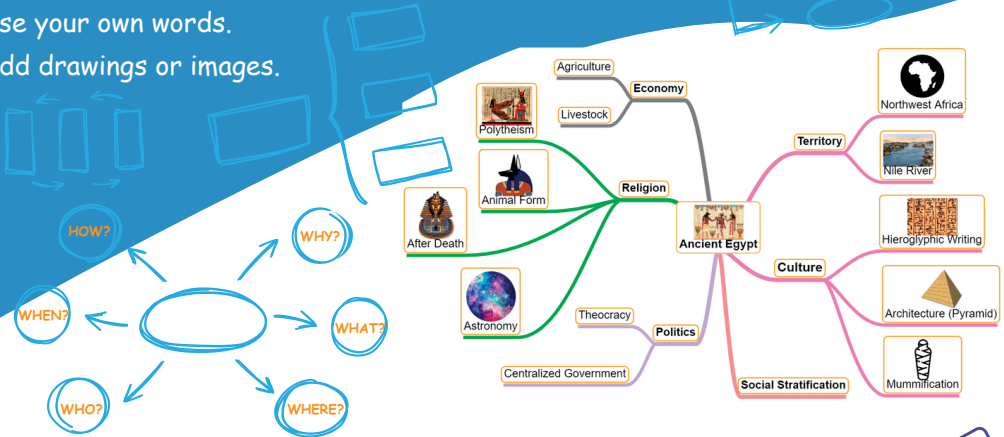

- Add drawings or images.



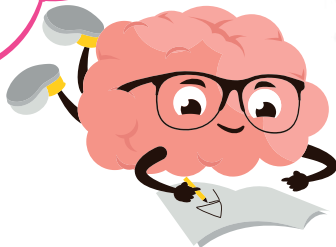
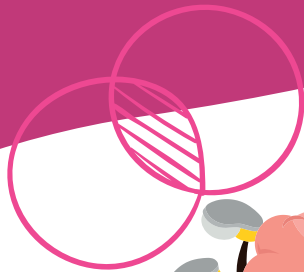
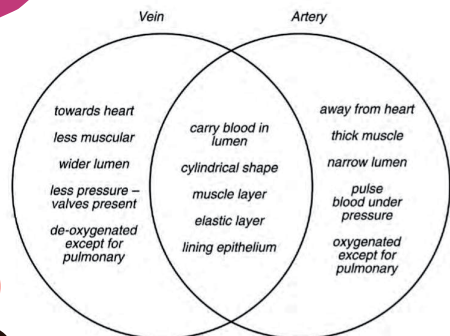
Venn Diagrams

Vein and Artery





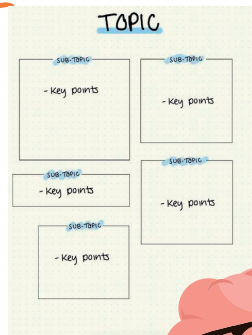
Note Making

- Link topics and add images/drawings.



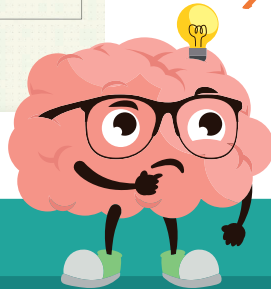
Cornell Method
